



For anyone with a passion for architecture Ardfert Cathedral will be a delight. St. Brendan 'The Navigator' was born in the Ardfert area in the sixth century. He founded the monastery not long before embarking on his legendary voyage. He was the subject of a medieval 'Life of St. Brendan' and the text known as 'Navigatio Brendani'. It was his cult which inspired the three medieval churches that stand on site today.

The earliest building is the cathedral begun in the twelfth century incorporating part of an earlier eleventh century church. It boasts some of the tallest thirteenth-century windows in Ireland and a spectacular row of nine lancet windows in the south wall. It is famed for its magnificent Romanesque West Door with blind arcading similar to that found at Cormac's Chapel on the Rock of Cashel

Athenry Castle

Athenry Town, Co. Galway





Athenry is one of the most notable medieval walled towns surviving in Ireland, owing its foundation to Meiler de Bermingham who built his castle there c.1250.

Athenry is one of the most notable medieval walled towns surviving in Ireland, owing its foundation to Meiler de Bermingham who built his castle there c.1250. The oldest part of the castle is the hall-keep. It is a large rectangular building originally containing only a hall at first-floor level and dark storerooms at ground level. For extra strength the lower part of the wall slopes out to form what is called a batter. The only original entrance was at first-floor level and would have been reached by an external wooden stairs similar to the present reconstruction. This gave direct access to the hall, the official and ceremonial reception room of the castle, where the lord received guests and tenants and presided over the manor court. Heat was probably provided originally by a brazier in the centre of the hall, with the smoke exiting through a louver or opening in the roof directly above. The garderobe or toilet is located diagonally across from the main entrance to the hall.

The fine carving on the exterior of the doorway and on the inner side of two of the window openings bears witness to the importance of the hall. The capitals in both cases are carved with floral motifs in local style, known as the "School of the West", dating from the late 12th and early 13th centuries.

Beneath the wild boglands of North Mayo lies a Stone Age farmed countryside that gives a unique insight into the sophistication of early farming nearly six thousand years ago.

The stone-walled fields, extending over hundreds of hectares, are the oldest known globally. Visitors can see the exposed field walls and dwelling enclosure on the neolithic surface and learn how these walls hidden under up to 4 metres of bog were located using a centuries old technique. They can also experience the natural blanket bog with its own unique vegetation and wildlife.

The award-winning visitor centre is set against some of the most dramatic Wild Atlantic Way coastline. A viewing platform on the edge of the 110-metre-high cliff will help you make the most of the breathtaking scenery.

As one of the largest military installations in the country Charles Fort has been associated with some of the most momentous events in Irish history. The most significant of these include the Jacobite Williamite War in 1690 and the Irish Civil War in 1922–23. Charles Fort was declared a National Monument in 1973. Across the estuary is James Fort, an earlier structure, designed by Paul Ive in 1602, in the aftermath of the 1601 Battle of Kinsale.

Protecting the town and harbour of Kinsale with its strong ramparts, bastions and outer defensives, Charles Fort will introduce you to the history of the making of modern Ireland. Here you will explore Ireland's heritage as a former British colony and its strategic maritime and historical connections with Europe.

Join one of our knowledgeable OPW guides to learn about Charles Fort's military architectural splendour. Discover what life was like for the enlisted soldier and his family and encounter the many interesting personalities associated with Charles Fort's military past.

Or you can meander around the site at your leisure and experience our multi-media exhibition within our restored Barrack Stores. After your voyage of discovery why not sit back and soak up the stunning views of Kinsale harbour from our Tearooms, while enjoying a selection of home-baked delights.



The Glebe House is the former home of the artist and collector Derek Hill. It is set on a hilltop sloping down to Lough Gartan, with the Derryveagh Mountains and Glenveagh National Park serving as a spectacular backdrop.

Derek Hill created a home for himself in the wilds of Donegal that was both unique and inspiring. It's often said that every picture tells a story; in the Glebe House, everything in the collection tells a story. The house is decorated with William Morris textiles and collections of Islamic and Oriental art. The full collection includes over three hundred works by leading twentieth century artists such as Picasso and Kokoshka. In addition there are wonderful collections of Irish, British and Italian works.

Derek Hill's studio and guesthouse was converted into a Gallery in the early 1980's by the OPW. It now displays a series of curated exhibitions each season.

The gardens at the glebe are an artist's haven a delightful blend of formal and informal gardens covering twenty acres on the banks of Lough Garten. There are points of interest everywhere with its large swathes of plants and wonderful trees. The gardens are open all year round from dawn until dusk.

The Blasket Centre on the mainland in Dún Chaoin (Dunquin) on the tip of the Dingle Peninsula is an architecturally stunning building celebrating the unique culture and heritage of the famed but now long abandoned Great Blasket Island. It is a "must–see" destination along the Slea Head Drive, the most westerly drive in Europe.

The Blasket Centre tells the story of island life, subsistence fishing and farming, traditional life including modes of work and transport, home life, housing and entertainment. A story unique to the Island and extraordinary window into Irish tradition and culture.

The Blasket Centre details the community's struggle for existence, their language and culture, and the extraordinary literary legacy they left behind with a library of Blasket authors translated from the original Irish to many other languages. Off the northern bank of the Shannon Estuary lies Scattery Island, the site of an early Christian settlement founded by an extraordinary man. St Senan, who was born in the area, built his monastery in the early sixth century. It included a mighty round tower, which at 36 metres is one of the tallest in Ireland.

There are six ruined churches on the site too. The Church of the Hill stands on a high spot, the very place where, legend has it, an angel placed Senan so that he could find – and then banish – the terrible sea–monster called the Cathach. It is believed that Senan is buried beside another of the medieval churches.

Scattery was invaded many times over the centuries. The Vikings in particular believed that the monastery held many riches and returned several times to ravage it.

A short boat trip will take you to the island, where you can explore its multi-layered, 1,500-year history.

This Dominican friary has dominated Sligo town centre since the midthirteenth century, when it was created by Maurice FitzGerald, the founder of the town itself. Some of the building from that period has survived the next nine centuries of turmoil.

The abbey was partially destroyed by burning in 1414, when it fell foul of an unattended candle, and suffered further mutilation following the Rebellion of 1641. According to legend, worshippers salvaged the abbey's silver bell at that time and threw it into Lough Gill. You can hear it peal even now – provided, that is, that you are wholly free from sin.

Despite the ravages of history, the abbey contains a great wealth of carvings, including Gothic and Renaissance tomb sculpture, a well-preserved cloister and a sculptured fifteenth-century high altar – the only such altar to survive in an Irish monastic church.
